Dear Colleagues and Community Partners,

Thank you for your support as The North Carolina Institute of Minority

Economic Development continues to collect data and report the necessary information in support of our diverse small businesses. As stated in our mission, we work "To strengthen the asset base of diverse populations through policy, education and economic opportunities." This 3rd edition of our survey results indicates a continued need for collaborative partnerships and deliberate dedication to addressing the challenges faced by diverse businesses state-wide.

Our target audience remains small diverse owned businesses with 50 or less employees. We have shared results of previous surveys with community stakeholders, government officials and corporate leaders to be used as guidance through policy changes and programmatic decisions. This survey will continue to equip community stakeholders with invaluable information about the impact of COVID-19 on diverse small businesses.

Over the past six months, we have released three surveys to gage how diverse small businesses are surviving during the economic downturn caused by the impact of COVID-19. Our data reveals our diverse communities and businesses have been devasted by this relentless pandemic. Local, state, federal and civic organizations have responded with vital resources to address these conditions. Our previous two surveys exposed the urgent need for various resources such as funding and technical assistance. The 3rd edition survey seeks to understand the continual challenges and long term affects, to which we offer suggestions regarding how we may provide additional support.

The most recent survey results revealed some new and existing key points.

- Most of the diverse suppliers are very small, however many are less than 5 employees
- Over half of respondents have been in business over 5 years, showing long term establishment
- Forty-three percent have not applied for grant relief funds, and of those who applied 70% did not receive anything
- Fifty-eight percent have not applied for any loan funds
- Of the businesses that are still operational, many have shifted their business models or have reinvented themselves to survive



Now that we have this information, what are our next steps? One simple action is sharing the survey results and recommendations below with local elected officials, corporate leaders, foundations and other community stakeholders and acting on them.

The top key recommendations we have previously identified are still relevant today. However, in addition, diverse businesses need to:

- Establish a culture of trust between funding agencies and small diverse businesses to encourage business owners to apply for grant and loan opportunities
- Develop a more streamlined process to access localized grant resources funded by municipalities, foundations, corporations, philanthropists and local stakeholders
- Encourage local citizens to express support by being intentional and buying locally to support diverse small businesses

These recommendations can make a significant difference as to how we address policy and in the interim, provide support for continued sustainability to those businesses on the brink of survival. We must remain committed and provide diverse businesses the tools and resources needed to survive through this challenging time. For those businesses fortunate enough to survive, we must address long term sustainability, continuity, preparedness and economic parity to facilitate equity, growth and prosperity.

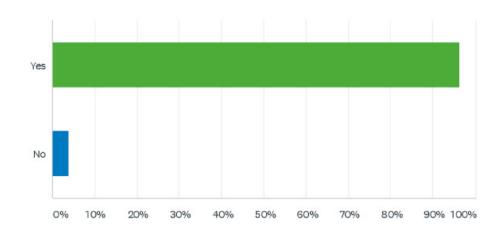

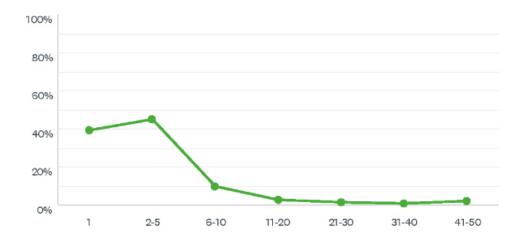

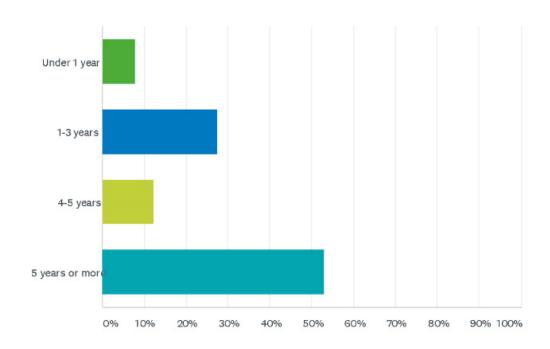

How many workers do you employ, including yourself?



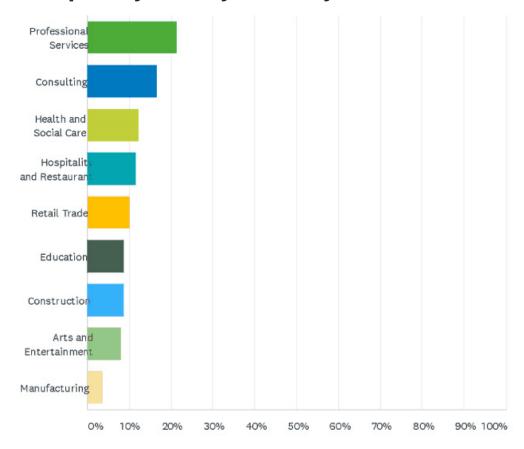

How many years have you been in business?



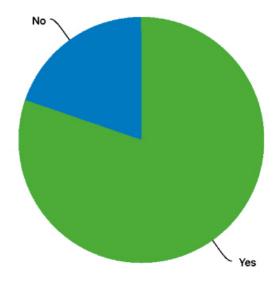

What is the primary industry in which your business identifies?



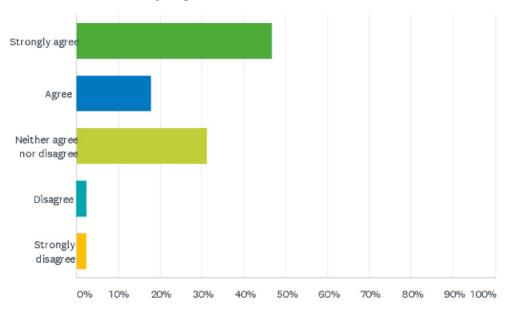

Are you currently operational?



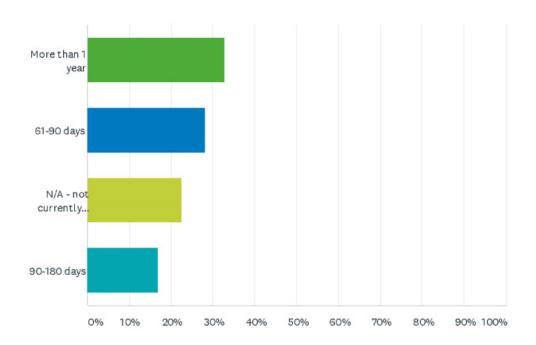

If you are not currently operational, is this closure due to COVID-19?



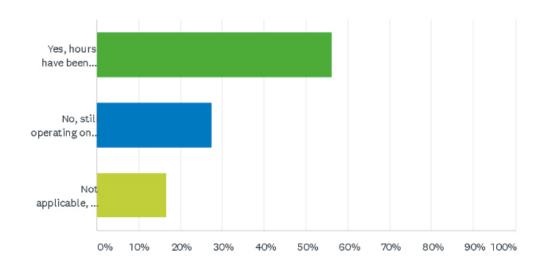

If you are currently operational, how long can you continue to operate under your current conditions?



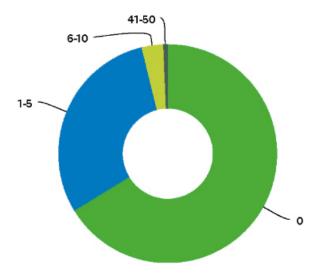

Are you currently operating under reduced hours?



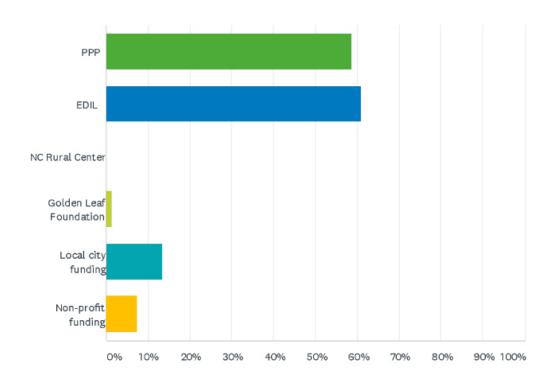

To date, have you laid off any staff?



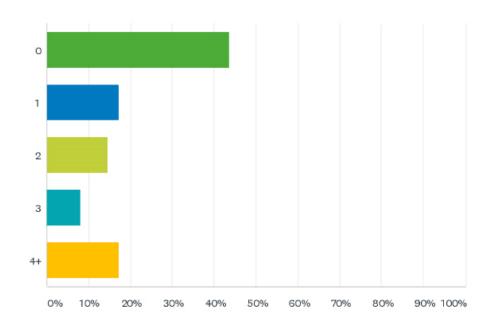

In the past six months, have you received any emergency debt relief funding from the following resources?



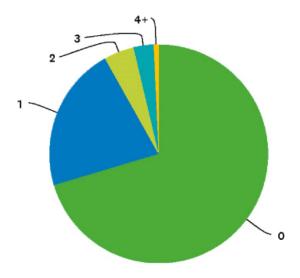

Have you applied for grant relief funding? If so, how many?



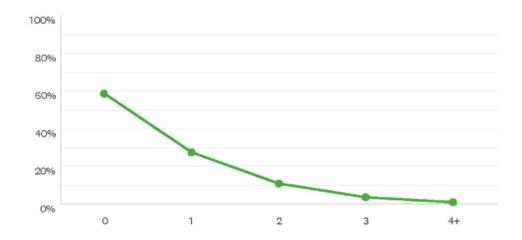

Of the grants you applied for, how many have you received?



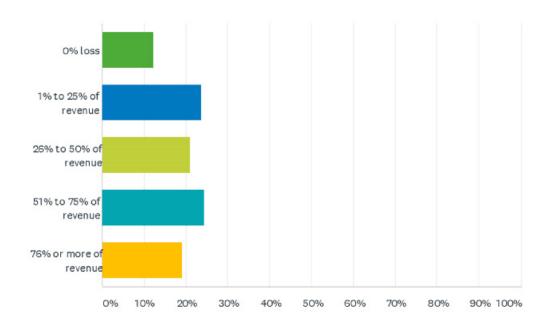

Have you applied for any loan relief funding? If so, how many?



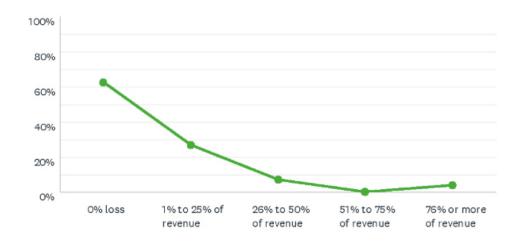

What is your revenue loss since March 2020?



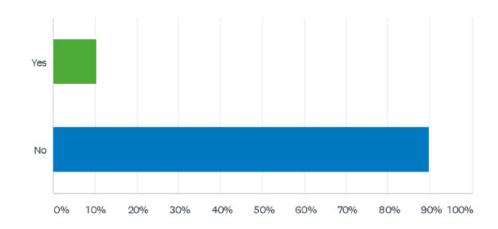
